

Beloved,

At our March Vestry meeting one of our members asked me which is harder Christmas or Easter. Without hesitating I answered Holy Week and Easter. Christmas is certainly busy, four services on Christmas Eve and one on Christmas Day. It is a whole lot all at once, but a whole lot of similar things. Christmas and Easter each carry a lot of meaning and importance for people, and that carries a heaviness of responsibility, but they pretty much share that. Christmas might carry a little more of that gravity culturally but Easter carries it theologically, so in that respect they're equal in different ways. What makes Holy Week and Easter harder is that even though the services are more spread out they are all very different. Now before I go on, harder doesn't mean worse or even bad at all, harder was not being used in a pejorative way. Think about it, good things are often hard, good things often take a lot out of us. That's how I see Christmas and Easter as being hard. So Holy Week and Easter are harder because there are quite a few services, if not so close together as at Christmas still fairly close together, that are theologically and culturally important and the services are all quite different from one another.

Remember though, good things are often difficult. I might talk about Holy Week and Easter being one of the hardest times of the year for me but they are also not only among my favorite days of the year but what I believe to be the most important days of the year. I believe that the services that make up the Holy Triduum: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and The Great Vigil of Easter as well as the services of Easter Sunday are the most powerful moments of our liturgical year. I cannot impress upon you enough, not just that these are beautiful liturgical moments worth your time but that they are the heart of our liturgical year. They are the core of all of our worship and life together as Christians. If for some strange reason you could only attend three church services a year I would tell you to attend the Triduum.

Beyond the weight of planning and leading these services, I understand the difficulty in attending them. Four days in a row of a heavy and meaningful services. That's not just a lot of time spent at

Returning to the Common Cup

Last fall I planned on returning to using the common cup during communion and retiring our intinction chalice. As the fall went on we began to see a spike in respiratory virus infections and I decided to wait until after the winter to make that change. As we are moving into spring the time has come and we will make that change in the weeks following Easter. As we prepare to make that change I want to discuss with you all a few things regarding communion. First, intinction is understood to not be the safest option for receiving the wine at communion. Our intinction chalice was chosen to mitigate the risks associated with intincting, but with a regular chalice intincting is understood to be riskier than sipping from the chalice. When intincting in a regular chalice there is risk of fingertips and fingernails making contact with the wine or fingers making contact with the side of the chalice, once again the chalice we have been using for intinction was chosen to mitigate those risks (this is why in the announcements when I mention intincting I make a point of saying "you may gently dip the host into the wine"). Sharing the common cup is widely accepted as the healthier option, so much so that some dioceses prohibit intinction altogether. When we make the switch back to sharing the common cup we will no longer allow intinction, because of the increased risks noted above, unless we have more people willing to serve as Lay Eucharistic Ministers (the technical title for chalice bearers). If we can ensure having two Lay Eucharistic Ministers every Sunday we will be able to offer both the common cup and the intinction chalice. As a final word about this, if you are uncomfortable receiving the wine from the common cup, or receiving the wine regardless of how it is administered, please know that our theology holds that receiving in one kind only is full and complete. This belief, called the doctrine of concomitance, holds that the body and blood of Christ are fully present in both the bread and wine of the Eucharist.

COBSJ "SPRING CONCERT"

The Chamber Orchestra of Barrington at St. John's presents the final concert of founding music Director Edward Markward's eight-year tenure. The concert features the premiere of Kari Henrik Juusela's "Barrington, Fantasy on a Hymn Tune by Daniel Read." Read was an early American tunesmith and part of the First New England School of composers. The work was commissioned by the COBSJ.

Kari Henrik Juusela is a Finnish-American composer, the former Dean of the Professional Writing and Music Technology Division at Berklee College of Music in Boston and principal cellist of the COBSJ. The "Fugue" from the Fourth Symphony by Charles Ives is also based on an early hymn tune and is a delightful companion to Juusela's work. Rounding out the program are W.A. Mozart's Overture and March of the Priests from "The Magic Flute" and his Symphony No. 35 in D Major, the "Haffner," perhaps the most sparkling of Mozart's great symphonies.

I promise if you join us on these days your faith and your life will be transformed.
